The Hump Back Bridge

Do you remember when.....

We were taken down to the airfield on double decker buses?

Do you remember the drive from Main Point down Chestnut Parallel?

Remember what happened just before we got to the right hand bend at the bottom of Chestnut Parallel?

Yes, that's right, the NCO apprentice in charge of the bus used to shout "Everybody to the left" as the bus turned into the bend. The old bus used to lean quite

dangerously and the driver would struggle to control it. After the bend he had to negotiate the next hazard - the hump back bridge. Just before the bridge, the order was given "everybody up". We all stood up and waited..... As the bus was on the apex of the

bridge, the order came "Down". Everybody sat down at the same time the object being to ground the bottom of the bus on the bridge!! Good game!!

Do you remember the day it backfired and we were met as we got off the buses and had to push the Vulcan back 3-4feet!! Not such a good game!!

When I went back to Halton some 20 odd years later as a Master Engineer taking a course of ab-initio Flight Engineers to ground run the Argosy, the Vulcan long gone by this time, all the above came flooding back to me as we went from Main Point down Chestnut Parallel. When we went through Halton village and got to the airfield I suddenly realised - no hump back bridge! The road was dead flat, where had the bridge gone to and why?

Back to the present and in the last year I have become very interested in narrow boating along the canals especially the Oxford, which is quite a good introduction to it. My children bought me an annual subscription to one of the magazines and idly flicking through the July edition I came across an article on the Wendover Arm of the Aylesbury Canal. Didn't know there was one, did you!!

Well, yes there is. It is six miles long and was built as a branch of the Grand Union canal opening in 1799 thereby linking the small market town of Wendover to the canal system and onto London. By the early twentieth century, it was leaking water away from the Grand Union and it was allowed to fall into dereliction. Now there is a restoration programme being coordinated by the Wendover Arm Trust, its aim being to reopen the full length of the Inland Waterways Arm. The Trust aim to do the project in three phases. With the help of volunteers, financial grants from the Association and the proceeds from the annual Tring Canal Festival! they are about two years away from the completion of Phase 1 - Tringford Stop Lock to Little Tring. Phase 2 shouldn't be too difficult from Little Tring to Aston Clinton. It is dry and volunteers have already started to remove vegetation. Both these sections will soon be ready to receive a new, modern lining, which, when laid, should stop the canal leaking - the cause of its closure. Phase 3, the, long term objective, will see the last four miles restored to Wendover. There is only one major obstacle on the - the lowered road bridge in Halton village!

We may yet see the return of The Hump Back Bridge!
